PASTOR'S REFLECTIONS

Now or never. Time to make it happen. That's my world, right about now. I need to get this last newsletter piece done.

Now, understand that I am not in this bind because I wasted my time, or didn't stay focused. I had something thought out. And then...the details aren't important, but things changed. They changed in ways that I did not expect, and so what I almost wrote yesterday isn't going to work. I need something new.

Kind of like Easter. Remember the stories we have heard? On Good Friday, we heard the story of the crucifixion. Jesus said, "It is finished," and bowed his head and died. That's it, all done!

And then, Easter morning? The women, coming down to the tomb to complete the task of embalming the dead, because he is dead. They have it planned out. They know what they need to do because they have a grasp of reality. The women harbor no false hopes, no foolish dreams, and no misguided notions.

Except, things have changed! As they walk the path they are unaware of what is about to unfold before them. Yes, the tomb will be empty, without a body to embalm. And yes, the angel will give them an extraordinary message. And yes, they will even meet the resurrected Jesus. All of this will surprise them.

But most of all, they will be changed. The power of the resurrected Christ changes the women. Taken from the shadow of death, they experience life they could never imagine. They experience nothing more and nothing less than God's gift of life right in the midst of death. That is to say, death is not cast aside – death is encountered, embraced, and overcome, all at the same time! And that is not what they expected!

It's not what we expect either. Of course, we know the line. We know that someday we will be in heaven, that death will be overcome, etc. But I'm not sure we really grasp what that means, and I'm not totally sure that in the end, we really buy it.

As we walk our daily path, do we join the women, walking to the tomb, knowing what life is really about, yet then, discovering the gift of life in the midst of death? Or...do we just nod our heads, and then go back to real life, where death is real?

Our reality is that we live in days that are stressed and threatening. The world is ever so smaller, the environment is threatening, the economy is shaky, and politics is uglier than we've seen in generations. These are tough times for people, and especially for disciples of Jesus.

At the same time, our culture is changing, creating new challenges for us as a faith community, challenges for which answers are difficult to find. How do we best craft our ministries to meet the needs of a changing

world? And how do we ensure we have the resources to do what we believe we are called to do?

But remember (and I write these words to myself as much as I write them to you), we are on the path with the women. We are headed to the tomb. We know the reality of a changing world, with ugly politics and all sorts of fears around us. We are, it seems, slowly dying.

And the tomb? It's full of death too. There will be no help there. No help at all, until...until we get there and we discover that God is at work. Until we discover that in the crucified and risen Jesus, embraced by a loving God, we walk right through death into the gift of life. Until we realize that we have been changed!

So as disciples of Jesus, this day (and every day) we walk with the women to the tomb, only to discover that all has changed. Even though our lives continue to confound us, we know that God is at work in our midst. And day in and day out, God makes you a new creation.

The same for us as a community of faith. We walk a path in the midst of a changing, challenging world, certain sometimes that the threats are more than we can handle. Yet, in the risen Jesus, God embraces us. And in God's embrace, we have all we can ever need.

And beyond all our expectations, we are made new and alive again!



in your prayers as they move into a new stage of their calling as disciples of Jesus.



Disciples come in all shapes and sizes. We have much to learn from our "elders" as these resident theologians have insights and stories to share. Harriet Skrade graciously allowed us to share a glimpse into

her story. Harriet, 93 years young, was welcomed, along with her husband, to Our Savior's in the early sixties.

Harriet's advice to new disciples of Jesus

... As we pray the Lord's Prayer, learn to accept "Thy will be done" and truly trust the Lord to give us the strength and the wisdom to abide by what he has in store for us. It is important to understand the power of prayer, to realize how much prayer helps us. As we mature, we find ourselves praying more for others rather than our own wants.

As Harriet talked about the power of prayer, she shared this story ... when Harriet would rock her son at night she would be saying her prayers out loud. One day when Jeff was a young child, after reciting several poems to his Grandmother, he proceeded to recite the Lord's Prayer and the Creed. Harriet had no idea he knew those prayers, but he picked them up from hearing her say them all the time. A family member told her ... Christian mother [parents], Christian child.

Harriet's favorite Bible passage ... because ... "Being justified by faith we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1). These words are on a plaque that Harriet received as a Christmas gift from her husband's younger brother early in their

marriage. The plaque has been on her bedside table for over 60 years!

Harriet's earliest memories of church ... Harriet remembers going to Sunday School, confirmation, and youth programs as a child at St. Peter's Lutheran Church in Prairie du Chien. The same pastor who confirmed Harriet also confirmed her son, Jeff!

As a "senior," Harriet would like to encourage the idea of sharing a ride to worship. Harriet never learned to drive and after her husband passed away and she no longer lived within walking distance of the church she couldn't get here. Through the years, Loretta Fritsch had become a "worship partner" with Harriet and when she realized Harriet was no longer able to get to church, Loretta (who lives in Onalaska) offered her a ride. Because of this "connection," Harriet has been able to attend worship regularly for more than eight years. Harriet says what a gift of commitment and Christian deed! Thank you, Loretta!

Thank you for sharing, Harriet! Please keep Harriet and all of our "senior" members (and "resident theologians") in your prayers.

A glimpse of our past gives me insight and strength for our future. I can't help but think we see God every day in the faces of our elderly.

I asked Alice Gums the other day what she thought about Senior Ministry and she simply said, "I think we do a good job of serving every age group in our congregation. I love our church!"

There are many opportunities to serve and share our time right here in West Salem and it is such a rewarding experience for everyone involved. Would you like to join us?
