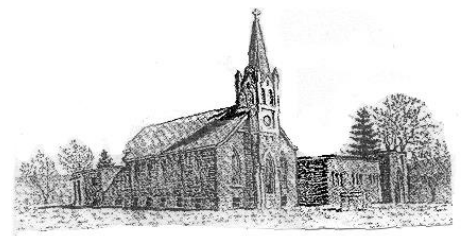

### *Pastor's Reflections*

#### **Ready ... set ... go ...**

We have been enjoying watching the Olympics these last weeks. The strength and stamina of the swimmers and runners, the precision of the gymnasts, the timing of the volleyball players ... it is just amazing. Think about all of the hours and years of practicing these athletes have done to get where they are. Think about all of the sweat and tears they have endured. Just to hear the words 'ready, set, go!' And in the blink of an eye, the race is over, the routine completed, the game concluded ... and there are winners and there are losers. We cheer for the home team, we cheer for the underdog; we grieve for those who have worked so hard, given so much, and come away empty. We marvel at the skills and the nerves of steel of these athletes. We hold our breath, sit on the edge of our seats, ooh and aah when things go well, and gasp when things go wrong.

As the people of God we hear the words 'ready, set, go'. In the waters of baptism, we are claimed as God's precious children. We have been sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. We are at the starting line ... we are ready ...

During the baptismal service, our parents and the community of the faithful promise to bring us to the Lord's house, to teach us the Creeds and the Ten Commandments, to place the Holy



Scripture in our hands, to live among God's faithful people, to proclaim Christ through word and deed, to care for others and the world God made, and to work for justice and peace. We are prepared, the groundwork is laid ... we are set ...

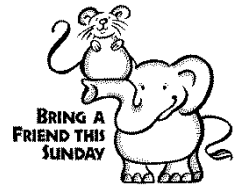
The S.O.S. Band will lead us, the Sunday School children will sing, we will hear God's Word and receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

## Hungry Jar Offering for September Lutheran World Relief School Kits



It's that time of year when we are getting things ready for school –

including school supplies. There are children in the world for whom going to school may not be possible because they can't afford the school supplies. Imagine having to choose between a meal or purchasing a notebook. Lutheran World Relief School Kits are sent to places where even the few required school supplies may be more than a family can afford. Pencils and paper can help write a positive future. Money raised in the Hungry Jar will be used to purchase supplies to complete 200 school kits. ### SCHOOL KITS FOR LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF

We have received word that the 200 school kits from 2015 have been sent to Nicaragua. LWR in-country staff and partners are distributing 40,000 school kits to communities associated with Lutheran World Relief's long-term agricultural work there. The kits will help keep all children in school, ensuring that they have the best possible chance of breaking out of the crippling cycle of poverty. Thank you!



Last year at this time, we had collected enough items to fill over 100 school kits. This year we are not yet at 50! Won't you please help?

The most needed items are pencil sharpeners, followed by notebooks (70 count), crayons (box of 24), blunt scissors, rulers, pens, pencils, and erasers. Please check the weekly bulletin for the most current updates!

Disciples come in all shapes and sizes. We have much to learn from our “elders” as these resident theologians have insights and stories to share. Chuck Paulson graciously allowed us to share a glimpse into his story. Chuck, 84 years young, and his wife LaVerne

have been avid fans of West Salem girls’ sports for many years, conveniently living across the street from the high school. Three years ago, they downsized and moved to Holmen. Chuck was also very involved at Our Savior’s during the building addition of 1991.

**Chuck’s advice to new disciples of Jesus ...**

Prayer is the right start for each day. It makes you want to do what is expected of you for that day. Every morning Chuck and LaVerne sit at their kitchen table, holding hands, and pray. They thank God for the new day and for the blessings they received the day before. They confess that they will abide by the Ten Commandments as best as they can and they close their prayer saying that they will show respect and kindness to all whom they come in contact with that day.

**Chuck’s favorite Bible passage ... because**

... *John 3:16-21*. The year before Chuck was born, when the family was living in South Dakota, his 7-year-old brother, John, died from a ruptured appendix. Chuck finds comfort from this scripture passage knowing that his brother has life eternal. These words give Chuck hope and he looks forward to eternal life and brotherly love.

**Chuck’s earliest memories of church ...**

Chuck was born in Roberts County, South

Dakota, but his parents were from Holmen, and the family moved back to rural Holmen when he was two. Chuck attended Sunday School at New Amsterdam Presbyterian Church; but was confirmed at Holmen Lutheran Church in 1946. He remembers riding his bicycle from their farm into Holmen (3 miles) for catechism classes on Saturdays.

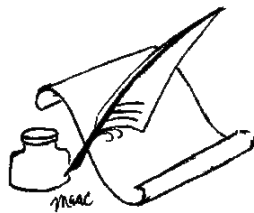


## Breakfast & Bible Study @ Salem Terrace

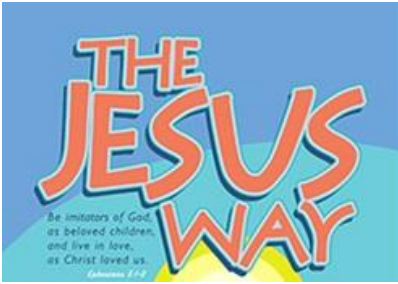

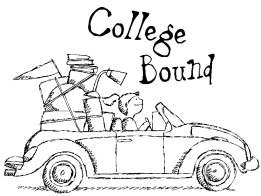
## HOSPITAL REMINDER

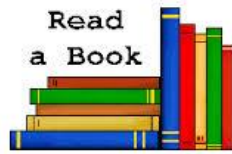

## ELCA CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY

*Cathryn Bottem, a junior at UW-L and a longtime member of Our Savior's, attended the recent ELCA Churchwide Assembly in New Orleans as a voting member from the La Crosse Area Synod. She shares her experience with us.*

I don't even know how to begin to describe the experience I had attending the Churchwide assembly in New Orleans. There were many nerves flowing through me as I had to fly by myself for the first time, and I flew Delta so my gate changed about three times at opposite ends of the terminal! I was praying to God to see if I was really meant to be there because I was having doubts at that moment.

I landed in New Orleans and made it the convention center about three hours late. Feeling incredibly embarrassed for going into worship late, I hid in the back until I was able to find my synod members after worship. I didn't really know what to expect—I was slightly nervous that it was going to be a lot of budgets and business stuff like at regional synod assemblies—but as soon as I walked into the main room for the plenary sessions, I knew that more was going to happen in this place.

A very heated topic concerning providing financial support to Israel came up, and I was shocked at how driven these Lutherans were to go to the microphone to state their feelings on this matter. I used to see Lutherans—myself included—as very timid and waiting for someone else to solve a serious problem. That was certainly not the case for any of the topics that came up to be voted on.

There was a bit of debate on the 32 Statements Agreement—an agreement that the walls between Catholics and Lutherans might come down so we could become one as children of God. I could see God shining light on that assembly when that passed, and the

Archbishop held up the communion cup saying, "I look forward to the day that we will share the body and blood of Christ from the same cup!" The cheering, hugging, and clapping showed how much people really wanted this resolution to pass.

We learned about the continuing hunger problem going on within our country and countries around the world, and the calling we have to continue to support that mission. The assembly alone raised \$40,000 in that short time we were there!! What an incredible experience to see what we can do when we come together in Christ.

Our theme was "Freed and Renewed in Christ," and "God's Work, Our Hands," and I saw that we are hearing the call of God and doing his work to help others. There was the AMMPARO Strategy (Accompanying Minor Migrants with Protections, Representation, and Opportunity) that passed and soon many children who are witnessing the violence of gangs in El Salvador will have a place of refuge and can be safe!

Everywhere I turned, I saw God acting in so many different ways to call others to service, and I felt callings myself to continue the work of others up here in the La Crosse area. This was truly an experience I will never forget, nor will I forget the indignant situations that are going on and that we, as Christians, cannot be silent or sit back to let someone else solve these problems. God is calling us to serve, and it can even be done up north in the La Crosse area.

Thank you for allowing me to represent the young adults of the La Crosse Area Synod, and I hope you will join me in starting programs to see a change in this world that God created.

Thanks be to God for He is good!
