Pastor's Reflections ...

What's New?

As you read this, I trust we have survived the chaos and emotion of the holidays, and now it's back to business as usual. Or is it? Not so fast ...



It is January after all. A new month, of a new year. We have new toys to play with, new clothes to wear, new foods to try, new relationships to nurture, new staff to welcome, new neighbors to greet, new bills to pay, new homes to settle into, new routines to get used to, new realities to adjust to, new classes and teachers to get to know, new diagnoses to wrap our head around ... doesn't sound like business as usual to me!

In the church, we have just celebrated the birth of the baby Jesus, and now we fast forward to the baptism of Jesus. As we celebrate Jesus' baptism, we also celebrate those who have been baptized here in this place during the last year – all 24 of them! (See the information elsewhere in the newsletter about worship on January 7th & 8th.) We remember being washed in the waters of the font, in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit. As a child of God, we remember being sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. We celebrate new life in birth and new life in Christ.

But, did you ever stop to think about what happens after an infant is baptized? What happens to that child? It's almost as if we in the church don't pay too much attention to them until they get old enough for



Sunday School and then we start to teach them about Jesus. As if turning four is the magic age when they can be introduced to Jesus. But don't we say that at baptism God claims these precious children as his own? And don't we as a congregation say that we will support these children and pray for them in their new life in Christ? So why not start right then and there, at baptism, to make Jesus a part of their life? And that is just what we are going to start doing in the New Year.

Thanks to a generous gift in memory of Herb Long, a life-long educator and man of great faith, at their baptism, we will be gifting the newly baptized infants and young children (0-3 years old) with their very first Bible. A Bible just right for them. We will also be keeping in contact with parents and walking the journey with them. There will be emails with age appropriate information about the stages of a child's growth and development. There will be times to gather together with parents and children to learn about Jesus - hear stories, sing songs, play games, make crafts. Families with children 0-3 years old who have been baptized in recent years will also be included to receive the emails and will be invited to our gatherings with parents and children. We are excited to be starting this new *Frolic* ministry with our youngest "members" of God's family.

As we celebrate the baptism of our youngest ones, we also celebrate our own baptisms. Do you remember the events of your day? Do you remember the date? What do you do to continue to celebrate this gift? It's a new year ... it's not too late to start ...

As the newness of the year starts to become routine, as the new toys become well used, as the new job becomes second nature, as the new teachers become well liked and beloved, remember there is one thing that always stays new. As we are claimed as God's precious child, the new life we receive in baptism is always made new ... it never grows old or wears out ... it never becomes outdated or passé. The love of Jesus is ours forever and it is fresh and new every day of our life.

REFORMATION REFLECTIONS

2017 is the 500th anniversary of the Protestant Reformation, initiated by Martin Luther. On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther nailed 95 "theses" on the church door at Wittenberg, Germany, starting a chain of events that would change the world. In fact, one group of historians labeled Luther as the third most influential person of the last millennium, just behind Einstein and Edison.

So, just what is the Reformation about anyway? During 2017, we'll explore the Reformation each month in the newsletter. We start with the monk who changed the world!

Martin Luther was born in 1483, in the principality of Saxony, in central Germany. His parents hoped he would become a lawyer. Instead, when he was twenty-one he became a Catholic monk. He wanted to earn God's love but was tormented by the sense that he could never be good enough. He punished himself mercilessly until finally a wise mentor sent him to study and teach Bible at the then new University of Wittenberg.

Not long after he arrived, he became incensed by the church saying, in effect, that if people bought a certain document—an indulgence—it would provide God's forgiveness for their (or a loved one's) sins. Being a university professor, he wrote a list of ninety-five sentences to debate the topic. That list, the Ninety-Five Theses, stirred up a hornet's nest in the church and began the Reformation.

Tradition says that he nailed the theses to the church door on October 31, 1517. Whether he did that or not, in short order, due in part to the recent invention of the printing press, Luther's list became public. The list spread across Germany at the very time that German nobility yearned for more freedom from the power of the church and the emperor.

For challenging the church and refusing to back down, Luther was called before the Holy Roman emperor, Charles V, at a meeting in the imperial city of Worms. Asked to take back what he had written, he refused and was declared an outlaw. Anyone could have captured him and killed him or turned him in to authorities, in which case his death was likely. Fortunately, his own prince protected him, hiding him out in a castle where he began translating the Bible into German. In the process, he helped create the standard German language.

Luther wrote many influential books, most of which are still valued today. He created the Small Catechism to guide ordinary people in learning about God. He wrote hymns such as "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." He called for a return to a church that honored the work of both clergy and laity, instituted many reforms in worship, and advocated the importance of education (in the church and in the community). Luther allowed clergy to marry, and even married himself, taking in a number of orphans into his home.

Luther was very human, and "down to earth." He was a passionate, sometimes crudely mannered man, and in later life, he wrote terrible, cruel things about the Jewish people, statements for which the Lutheran church has apologized. Yet Luther was a remarkable man, helping to create the modern notion of what it means to be an individual, not just an atom in a sea of molecules, and, of course, reviving and reforming the church.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER (THANK YOU, THANK YOU!)

Stewardship is more than just a fall campaign to get members to give of the treasures that God has given them to help create a system of "Financial Well-Being" but also to develop programs to utilize all of the time and talents of our members. The real value of the fall campaign is to share with members the importance of receiving some type of "Estimate of Giving" for the upcoming year. It is almost impossible to develop an accurate budget without some idea of what people might contribute in the upcoming year. Estimate of Giving is exactly what it says, an estimate, though very similar, not necessarily a pledge.

The fall campaign this year consisted of hand delivering over 300 letters that included candy kisses and a request to return an "Estimate of Giving" card back as soon as possible. Over 50 volunteers helped personally to deliver these letters within a two or three day span. The Stewardship Committees greatest hope is that we would receive 100% of the "Estimate of Giving" cards back by the first of the year. As of January 1, we have received 91 cards with an estimate of approximately \$181,600.00.

Just a little reminder that you can still set up an Electronic Funds Transfer at any time called "Simply Giving" by contacting the church office. This makes things easier for you to budget for any contributions. Also, you can start, stop, increase or decrease just by contacting the church office.

We would like to thank every family or individual that has returned their "Estimate of Giving" card and like to thank anyone else who still plans to send it in. It is never too late.

Celebrating our Resident Theologians...

Disciples come in all shapes and sizes. We have much to learn from our "elders" as these

resident theologians have insights and stories to share. Harriet Slack graciously allowed us to share a glimpse into her story. Harriet, 87 years young, grew up on a farm and then raised her family on a farm as well. They had four daughters and one son. They also cared for several foster children who were abused or in trouble, teaching them life skills of canning, bread baking, gardening, and doing farm chores.

Harriet's advice to new disciples of Jesus ... Prayers always help you ... have confidence that the Lord will help you. Harriet said she feels bad that she is no longer able to get to church here (although she does attend services at Eagle Crest where she lives), and she always feels better after a visit and communion from one of our pastors or home communion ministers.

Harriet's favorite Bible passage ... because ... the book of Psalms. Harriet reads the

Psalms often as they help her get through the days and nights, especially when she is feeling down. She starts at the beginning of the chapter and reads them in order.

Harriet's earliest memories of church ... Her family was poor and they didn't go to church. She remembers being 12 years old and going to "summer study" for the first time at Powers Hills Lutheran Church (Lawrence Ridge near De Soto) with her friend Eleanor. Eleanor's father would pick up Harriet on the way to church as they lived on the ridge past her family's farm. Harriet also remembers the wonderful dinners at the little church with a cemetery. Harriet and her husband were married in Liberty Pole in the Methodist pastor's yard. They attended that church while living in Liberty Pole, and joined Our Savior's in 1991 after they moved to West Salem.

Thank you for sharing, Harriet! Please keep Harriet and all of our "senior" members (and "resident theologians") in your prayers.


SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS
