PASTOR'S PAGE

Over the past 18 months, two teams have been working on future planning for Our Savior's. The one team considered our building use. Their plan was affirmed by the annual meeting, and a specific proposal will come to the congregation shortly for final approval.

The other team spent a lot of time listening to different groups within the congregation. How do we see God at work in our midst? What do we discern God's calling to be?

At the council meeting in March, they presented a new vision statement:

We are a church centered in Christ, inviting all into a community of worship, nurturing all to be disciples of Jesus. Together we reach out to make a difference here and throughout the world.

The council really liked it! So there it is – our new vision statement. And what better time to ponder our vision, then looking ahead and seeing the cross and the empty tomb beckoning!

We are a church centered in Christ...

Of course we are, right? Look, Good Friday and Easter (the "Triduum") are (or should be) our focal point. To be honest, that's not always true. Frequently we get sidetracked and diverted. Like the color of the carpet, or

how balanced our budget looks, or whether or not the thermostat is set right. But while we pay some necessary attention to those matters, they are not what we are about. We are about Jesus, the crucified and risen Christ. That is our core. Nothing more, nothing less.

...inviting all into a community of worship...

We worship. That's what we do. On Saturday, Sunday, special days, we worship. But we also worship in our daily lives. In our thoughts and our prayers, but also in our words and our actions. What we say and do, every day, is a part of our worship. And what are we worshiping? The crucified and risen Christ, of course! The one of Good Friday and Easter.

The one who died for me...and for all people. That's why invite all. And "all" means "ALL!" We are a place for all of God's children, even those who might not be welcome in other places. And we don't just welcome – we invite – we reach out intentionally to let all know that this is a place for them!

...nurturing all to be disciples of Jesus.

Moreover, we seek to "make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19) – and of all ages. This congregation has a special ministry to families, children, and teens. God gifts us with them, that we make of them disciples of Jesus. But we also treasure other generations, who also seek to be faithful, and who have much to share. We want to make multiple generations

disciples of the crucified and risen Jesus who makes the decisive difference between life and death! Why? Because the people of God, the Body of Christ, is made up of ALL of God's children, young and old alike!

Together we reach out to make a difference here and throughout the world.

But we're not done yet. We – you and I, young and old, all of God's people, have a calling. We are to be disciples. Disciples here in the midst of this congregation, and in what this congregation does inside our walls, in the community around us, and throughout the world. Together, we make a difference. Together we change the world. Together, we impact the lives of people!

But also as we go out, each one of us, in our journeys of life. Seven days a week, with our friends and families, even with strangers, we are called by God to proclaim in what we say and what we do that the crucified and risen Jesus makes the difference in our lives – and in theirs too. We are called to bring good news to broken people in a very complicated and fearful world.

So, that's our vision. Or maybe better yet, God's vision for us! In the new life we have in Jesus, we go out and proclaim that new life to a hurting world. Centered in Christ...inviting all...nurturing disciples...making a difference.

The call of a faithful God, to be anchored in what God has done for us, that we may proclaim what God is doing for others. Good Friday and Easter at work in me, in you, and in all those whom we encounter.

I like it!

CHANGES AFOOT!

There are several significant changes at Our Savior's, coming down in the next few months...

- Red Balloon, the day care provider in the lower level, has announced plans to close their West Salem operation, due to space and staffing issues. We knew they would be seeking a new location, leaving our building, but we had hoped they would remain in the community. Red Balloon's last day will be June 9, with the rest of the month for moving out. After 32 years, that's a big change for Our Savior's! We will seek to find a way to acknowledge and give thanks for the ministry that has taken place over those years.
- We continue to move forward with plans to repurpose the space in our building.
 We hope to have a special congregational meeting before summer sets in to approve the expenditure necessary to prepare our building for our future ministry needs.
- The Rental Management Committee, in response to the annual meeting, is exploring the possibility of selling the parsonage. Any decision to sell the parsonage will require congregational approval at a special congregational meeting. We will keep you posted!

CONGREGATION COUNCIL REVIEW

The Congregation Council met on Monday, March 13, with President Steve Ahles calling the meeting to order. At this meeting the council:

 Appointed Jake Iliff to fill the open three-year council position for one year,

- with a special election at the 2018 annual meeting.
- Began with devotions and discussion around the proposed new vision statement.
- Approved the minutes from the February council meeting. Received and reviewed financial reports and reports from the pastors.
- Continued to discuss same gender marriages and how to listen with care to all sides. Decided to explore the process other congregations have used.
- Voted to adopt the new vision statement for the congregation.
- Heard a report from the task force on building space. Authorized up to \$500 for expenses in preparing a proposal for the congregation.
- Authorized the liquidation of assets in the Carol Ann Noel bequest, in order to disburse to the Mission Endowment Fund and other ministries.
- Appointed Cathryn Bottem, Lynette Ender and Judy Gilbert as delegates to the Synod Assembly. Two more will be needed.
- Heard that Dennis Manthei, Linda Berg and Jim Michelson will be reviewing the financial assets of the congregation.
- Heard an updated on Red Balloon and their plans to leave the building by the end of June.

The council meets again on Monday, April 10. See Steve Ahles or one of the pastors if you have any questions.

It's hard to believe we are already three-fourths of the way through our Sunday School year – as of this



REFORMATION REFLECTIONS

Another installment in a yearlong reflection on the Reformation, what is was, and what it means to us today.

The Augsburg Confession, written in the midst of the Reformation tumult, is the core statement of what Lutherans believe. It was produced in 1530, thirteen years after young professor Martin Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses in Wittenberg. A lot had happened in those thirteen years. Thanks to Luther's creative exploration of the gospel and its implications, his colorful personality (opponents had other adjectives), and the availability of the printing press, his views on religious matters as well as the politics of the day had been widely distributed. In many parts of central Europe, people were responding favorably, to the consternation of the Church of Rome, which had been accustomed to being the single expression of the Christian church in that region.

In the sixteenth century there was no nation called Germany. Rather, the various duchies and electorates made up a key part of the Holy Roman Empire, a remnant of the European territory once governed by ancient Rome. For much of Reformation times, Charles V governed as Holy Roman Emperor. He had watched his empire become increasingly fractured by divisions among princes favorable to Luther and other reformers, and those who kept their loyalty to Rome and the pope. The emperor needed the princes to be unified, not least because a Turkish invasion of Europe had reached the gates of Vienna. And so, in January 1530, the emperor called for a diet, or general assembly, in the German city of Augsburg. He asked the German princes and imperial cities to explain their religious convictions.

And so, reforming theologians and the rulers who supported them headed for Augsburg—among them, Luther's colleague Philipp

Melanchthon and his pastor, Johannes Bugenhagen. Luther himself could not accompany them because he had been named an outlaw at a previous diet. He had also been excommunicated by the pope. He was, however, consulted on the final text via mail.

Upon their arrival in Augsburg, Melanchthon, consulting with previous preliminary documents, composed the final text of the confession. The German princes who favored the Reformation viewpoint agreed to it and signed it. On June 25, 1530, the Augsburg Confession was read aloud in German before the emperor and presented in written form in both German and Latin.

The Augsburg Confession (sometimes called Augustana from its Latin title) is now found in a larger collection of Lutheran confessional writings called The Book of Concord. It contains twenty-eight parts, or articles. The first twenty-one of these stress points of agreement with the Roman Church of the time, though sometimes with crucial differences. In the last seven, the writers lay out what they see as abuses committed by the church.

The Augsburg Confession continues to guide the teachings of Lutheran churches to this day. Though a product of troubled times, it is filled with optimism and hope as it bears witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

"elders" as these resident theologians have insights and stories to share. Alice Pfaff graciously allowed us to share a glimpse into her story. Alice, 88 years young, has been making baby quilts for baptisms since 2004 what a gift that ministry is to our littlest ones.

Alice's advice to new disciples of Jesus ... God sees us through hard times and heartaches. Alice has always gone to church, because that's what you do. Church has always been an important part of her family's life - from her own growing up, to raising her children.

Alice's favorite Bible passage ... because ... John 3:16 ("For God so loved the world ...") and Psalm 23 ("The Lord is my shepherd ..."). These were passages Alice had to memorize during confirmation and they have stuck with her all these years. As she recites the words, they speak to her and bring comfort.

Alice's earliest memories of church ... As a very young child. Alice went to the Norwegian Lutheran Church in Barre Milles. When she was a little older, the family went to Trinity in La Crosse and that is where she was confirmed. and she and Myron were married. Alice and Myron live in Bangor and came to Our Savior's just before their children were born. Alice didn't drive when her children were young and Vicky Johnson's in-laws would pick up Alice's children and bring them to Sunday School here at Our Savior's.
