Pastor's Reflections ...

New stuff on the horizon...
Are you ready to be faithful?

At a recent memorial service, we used several Bible passages, including Revelation 21:5 – “I make all things new.”

Great words for the season! April begins this year with Easter. Easter, the biggest “newness” around. In the wonder of Easter God acts to turn death into life, to restore life where it had been lost, and to renew and revitalize life that had been drained. “I make all things new!”

For a grieving family those were words of hope in the midst of a dark moment. God makes the radical promise that death is not the end. And how so? The death of Jesus on the cross, and the resurrection of the empty tomb turn our world upside down. God acts to bring life where there was none, and suddenly the power of death is overthrown.

But not just for mourners at a memorial service. For you and for me. Right there and now. Today.

“I make all things new.”

These are challenging times in our world, our society, and especially in the church. With the world around us changing rapidly, and with increasing tensions, it's hard to have a lot of hope for the future.

Sometimes it's even harder in the church scene. As our society has changed, church life has been stressed. We wonder what is happening around us, and how we can cope. What shall we do?

And what about the new challenges in life around us? Like same gender marriages. See the report elsewhere in this newsletter on the results of our recent survey. Regardless of what we do, we will be challenged.

But...“I make all things news.” Really.

That's the promise. But, do we believe it? There's new stuff, always new stuff happening, but are we ready to be faithful?

Maybe part of our challenge is to allow God's newness to really happen. Our society has changed, but maybe we still want our church life to stay the same. Maybe we want God to do new things, but are we ready to embrace – faithfully – the newness around us?

I will confess, after 30+ years of pastoral ministry, that I'm not always eager to embrace the new. I like what I've done, and it's worked (for me, at least). Once I was the new pastor, wondering why the old guys (and back then, a few women) wouldn't eagerly go in new directions. Now I get it. I'm safe and comfortable where I am. Because I am (I imagine) in control.

To embrace God's new things is to let go of that control, and I'm not always ready to go there. That makes me too vulnerable!

Yet, the Easter story reminds me that this is about life and death, and to live is to always be changing, to always experience something new in my journey. Even if at the moment it's just another new gray hair on my head.

The power of the crucified and risen Christ overcomes my fears and failures. It renews and restores me in moments of crisis and uncertainty, and it frees me to embrace the "new," even when the "new" is not what I'm looking for, even when the "new" pushes me to my limits. Because in the death and resurrection Jesus overcomes all things. Even newness!

And so as I look at who and what we are, and the challenges before us, from same gender issues to worship attendance, from finances to welcoming new partners in our work together, I hear those words again – "I make all things new" – and I know that God's hand is at work. God's hand stirring up the world, to make all things new. And God's hand embracing and nurturing me to be faithful in a world in which, all things are new!

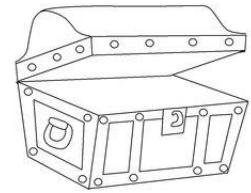
SUNDAY SCHOOL NEWS

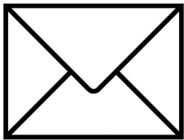

What's going on in the Youth World!?



ELCA YOUTH GATHERING in HOUSTON – Over 30,000 youth from across the country will converge on Houston in late June under the theme “**This Changes Everything.**” We will worship, go out into the local community and help with the continued clean-up efforts from last summer’s hurricanes, meet new people, gather with others from our synod, have time for fun activities, hear the faith stories of speakers, and dig deeper into our own personal faith stories. In the months to come we will be asking for your help to collect funds for the **Global Farm Challenge** (agriculture related programs of ELCA World Hunger) and **Houston Literacy Campaign** (the goal is to collect 100,000 books for the children in Houston). We invite the congregation to be a part of our fundraising opportunities – monies collected will be used to help our students get to Houston, and also to support the Global Farm Challenge and Literacy Campaign.

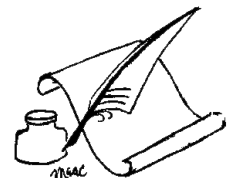

Prayer Around the Cross *By, Jon Hetland*

I would like to take this opportunity to tell you about a prayer ministry that not too many people in our congregation have taken advantage of as of this writing. This ministry is the Prayer Around the Cross service held on the second Sunday of each month at 6 PM. I know that many times people might be a little reluctant to try something new so let me tell you about what we do and why I think you should give it a try.

The service itself is quite simple with a few songs, and readings from the pastor followed by plenty of time for reflection and silent prayer from the participants. We then end the service by lighting candles for any prayer concerns we may have and placing them in a bed of sand around the cross. Pretty easy stuff!

Pastor Jon has said that even though our numbers are small and that the problems of the world are many, it is ultimately our presence that matters. I find it very refreshing to step out of the very often selfish person that I am to take time to think and pray about problems of this world both large and small. In my own busy life I know it is hard for me to slow down and think about the big issues that really matter. This service helps me focus and leaves me feeling refreshed. I still may not be able to solve all the problems in the world but when I leave the service I am hopeful that at least I can take a baby step in the right direction.

Stewardship Corner



Stewardship
a way of life

Does our stewardship, does our sharing of what God has entrusted to us really make a difference in the world? That's a valid question to ask. Here's an answer!

Several years ago, the ELCA made a commitment to make a difference in working to end malaria deaths. Our Savior's joined thousands of other congregations in supporting the ELCA Malaria Campaign. By the end of 2015 the campaign reached its goal of \$15 million! So, for starters, thank you for your part of this monumental milestone and helping protect countless lives from this preventable, treatable disease. It simply doesn't happen without people digging a bit deeper to make a difference.

But...what happened? Working with our Lutheran companions and partners in 13 African countries, we have brought about lasting change. But our work is not over. While the campaign has been completed, our commitment to ending deaths from this disease has not... In the coming years, support to our companions and partners to address malaria will come through gifts to ELCA World Hunger, which has a long history of supporting health-related work. And again, without you, none of this would have been possible. On behalf of the whole church, *thank you for your prayers, your partnership and your generosity.*

Finally, the numbers...together, we:

- Educated 2 million community members.
- Distributed 50,000 insecticide-treated bed nets.
- Tested 160,000 people for malaria, and if positive, provided treatment.
- Trained 10,000 local volunteers in prevention and treatment.
- Empowered 12,000 households to be economically stable.
- Provided 32,000 pregnant women prevention medication.

That's a lot of stewardship, a lot of ministry, and a big difference!

Hunger is Baaaaad!

Its sheep time in the La Crosse Area Synod! Just as two years ago, we were invited to bring cows to the Synod assembly, each representing \$500 in offerings toward the world hunger appeal, this year we are asked to bring sheep – lots of them!



We've got a start – our first sheep is set, with the 7/8th grade confirmands putting the tip money from the recent Norwegian dinner (along with a few extra dollars donated for the cause) to raise the first \$500. So, one sheep is set.

How about the rest of you? Can we pull together and clone a few more sheep, raising a few more dollars, saving a few more lives? You can make your gift by marking your envelope (sheep project), and we'll start adding it all up. Watch too for opportunities in the next weeks to have some fun with the sheep, while making a difference in the lives of those who hunger for the very basics of life!

Stewardship...the Whole Life Way!

What is whole life stewardship? In large part it is a term referring to the completion of one's stewardship of possessions by providing for the continued work of the church after we leave this earthly realm. How



do we do that? A key way is to name Our Savior's, or an ELCA ministry or ministries as a beneficiary in our will or living trust. It is estimated that as much as 80% of the major gifts to ELCA ministries are made in this manner. There are also other ways to practice whole life stewardship. Naming Our Savior's, the La Crosse Area Synod, or other ELCA ministry as the beneficiary (whole or partial) of a life insurance policy is a popular way to continue one's stewardship (by the way, Pastor Jon and Pastor Jean

have done that, with both Our Savior's and the synod as beneficiaries). Naming ministries as beneficiaries of gift annuities or deferred gift annuities is another way to practice whole life stewardship while assuring donors a fixed life income. Naming ministries as partial beneficiaries of IRAs and other qualified retirement plans avoids income taxes on the gifted portion of the asset that would otherwise be due at death. Consider your legacy to future generations and be a whole life steward of God's many blessings.

You can always have a chat with Pastor Jon or Pastor Jean about your "whole life stewardship." They can share what they have done, why they have done it, and how it works for them.

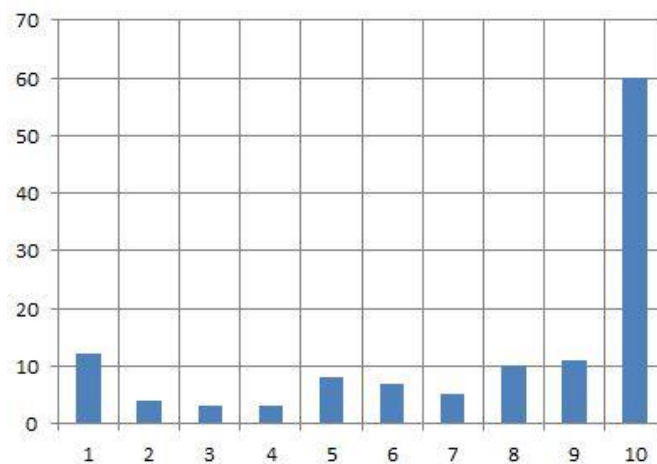
Same Gender Marriage Conversation

The Congregation Council met on Monday, March 12, with President Steve Ahles calling the meeting to order. At this meeting the council:

- Heard about plans to explore how we live out our mission statement. Will discuss more at the April meeting.
