Pastor's Reflections

As I write this, five weeks to go. Five weeks from this very moment, Advent will have passed, Christmas services done, and it will be “clean up:” and New Year’s diet time.

But not yet. First, Advent and Christmas. But not like last year. Not virtual, with no one in the sanctuary, but the two of us and a camera. This year, this year – it will be Christmas!

Well, sort of. The virus is still out there, doing nasty things. Area hospitals are pretty much full, numbers remain high, and for some, the virus has become a matter of life and death – literally!

So, we will journey through Advent, and celebrate Christmas, but do what we need to do to remain safe. And to protect others. To live out our calling to care for others, to even be sacrificial for the sake of those around us. The younger, the older, the vulnerable. After all, isn’t that what Jesus would do? Oh, that’s right – he did that. We call it the Crucifixion!

But for the moment, Christmas. The good news is that we will be in person this year. We will gather for Advent worship each week, and then Christmas Eve and Christmas Day will be in the building.

Remember, however, that we want to be safe – and to protect others. And so we shall. Check out the article in this newsletter about upcoming worship opportunities for all the details, but in a nutshell here’s the scoop:

- Christmas Eve worship will have some limits on numbers. You will be asked to sign up so you know you have a seat.
- Meanwhile, we’ve added an extra service to accommodate the numbers.
- Yes, we will still need to be masked. The science is pretty clear – masks work!
- There will be a Zoom service from the barn.
- A prerecorded video will be posted to YouTube.

Well, that sort of takes a bit of the luster off the Christmas star, now doesn't it? I mean, if we can't all gather, in a packed church, celebrating the season, what's there to celebrate?

I know. I get it. I look forward to Christmas Eve, to services that fill the building and voices proclaiming the joy of the season. It's always a wearying day for us, as we work through the services. Yet, at the same, it is exhilarating. As the crowd gathers, to sing with joy, hear the story, and see the candles, reminding us of the "light that shines in the darkness ..."

And now, with a smaller crowd, without the energy that comes from a packed house ... what's one to do?



Take a peek, that's what!

Look, there are some things I'm really excited about this year. Seriously!

- Advent worship – and especially the second week (December 8). Weather permitting, we will end the service in the parking lot, around the fire pit, with a final act of worship – and then – S'MORES! Yes, you read that right – Christmas S'mores!
- Christmas Eve we are going back to the barn for a Zoom service. OK, it didn't work last year, but I'm not giving up on that. Too awesome!
- The Pre-recorded YouTube. Last year that video was viewed in Massachusetts...in California...in Illinois...in Michigan...and right here. The worship itself takes on new power knowing that it reaches places we simply cannot otherwise reach.

But is that enough?

Of course not. All of that makes this Christmas a bit more appealing. But I'm still stuck with a virus and a less than half packed church.

Until. Until I take a peek. Take a peek inside that small, wooden box. The box we call a manger. Until I see the child who lies there.



These are times that tire us out, and the Christmas experience, for the second year in a row, is not what we want it to be. But as hard as it is for us to hear and accept, Christmas is not about what we want. Christmas is about what God is up to! And even in a somewhat twisted, broken, hurting world, God is still at work.

That is a deeper sense of what this season is all about. We imagine, with a somewhat “romantic” view, that Christmas is about a quaint scene – an old barn, a silent night, with gentle animals all around, and the soft glow of a newborn child brightening this quiet moment.

But really, the Christ child came into a dirty, cold, smelly place, in the midst of a very hard, painful, and overwhelming world. This is not about a serene moment. It is about God acting in the midst of a broken world. As the world cries out for life, God delivers!

Sound familiar? Isn’t that our world today? Hard, painful, overwhelming? Yet, there it is. The manger, the Child, the hope. God at work 2000 years ago; God at work today!

And so yes, Christmas is not yet what we want. But it will be what God wants it to be. And since this is “God’s gig,” not ours ... that’s OK. In fact, that’s great – because when Christmas is God’s thing, then Christmas is about God acting to bring life. Beginning in the manger, moving on to the cross, and then to the empty tomb. God at work, life in us.

Not the way I want it, but it is what I need! This year, especially!

Mission Endowment Fund Making A Difference - Again!

The Mission Endowment Fund Committee met recently to make disbursements for this year. A record \$17,300 was available for the 19th year of disbursements. Over that time over \$200,000 has been disbursed to ministries and organizations that meet the needs of people in our community and beyond.

Disbursements this year include:

- \$4000 for Afghan refugee resettlement
- \$2000 to the ELCA World Hunger Appeal
- \$2000 to Sugar Creek Bible Camp
- \$1000 to Sleep in Heavenly Peace, to provide beds for children who have none
- \$1000 to the Warming Center to assist the homeless
- \$1000 to New Horizons to meet the needs of families in crisis
- \$1000 to St Claire Health Mission to provide medical care to those without insurance, who cannot afford care.
- \$1840 to Our Savior's to increase our Sugar Creek Camperships
- \$3460 to Our Savior's, as required, for a future capital project as determined by the Congregation Council

Every year the proceeds of the fund make a difference in the world. Consider including the fund in your estate planning, and make a difference for years to come! See Pastor Jon or Melody Schmitz for more information.

Congregation Council

The Congregation Council met on Monday, November 8, with President Jen Linse presiding. At this meeting the council:

- Continued to have conversation and discussion about young people and their needs. Ended the time with prayer.
- Approved the minutes of the October 11 Council Meeting, and received the October financial report.
- Heard an overview on what has been happening with our various ministries.
- Heard an update on the tech project and the landscape project.
- Discussed staffing options during Kris Seeger's absence.
- Heard a report from the Reopening Team.
- Discussed Christmas worship options, with a preference for in-building worship done safely.
- Heard that due to supply chain issues the tech project will be delayed another 4-5 months.
- Opted to meet in December at Pastor Jon and Pastor Jean's home, with a meeting and small Christmas gathering for council members.

The next meeting of the council will be held Monday, December 13th at 7 PM, at Pastor Jon and Pastor Jean's home. If you have questions, or if you have ideas for enhancing the ministry of Our Savior's, contact Jen Linse or one of the pastors.

Did you know...



The CARES Act adopted earlier last year allows you to take the standard deduction in your Federal income tax and (for 2020 and 2021 only) take an extra \$300 deduction for charitable giving (\$600 for married couple, filing jointly.) Giving to Our Savior's, or any other 501(c)(3) organization counts.

Why these provisions? To encourage charitable giving during these difficult times. But, as always, consult a qualified tax advisor for all the details.
