
Pastor's Reflections ... Rooted in God's Love ...

As Pastor Jon seeks to find God's presence at work in small, seemingly insignificant places these months of his sabbatical, I, too found myself surrounded by God's presence leading up to and at Synod Assembly.

As our voting members from Our Savior's sat at the Pre-Assembly Caucus in April listening to the various positions that needed candidates to be elected, they were bombarded with the concept of the importance of including

youth and young adults in the life of the synod. And, their wheels were spinning ... it was, after all, the afternoon of our 9th grade confirmation worship service, where they saw 22 of our youth confirmed. Aha! We should bring a youth to Synod Assembly! And, the plan was hatched ... and Graham Sjoquist was the one they had their sights on! We were all excited when Graham accepted the invitation to join us! *God at work in young people!*

In the days leading up to Assembly, I volunteered to be part of the Reference and Counsel Committee, whose task was to review the resolutions that were submitted for consideration, working with the authors to make sure they met the standards to be able to move forward for discussion and voting at the Assembly. It was interesting work. But then I "got volunteered" to be the chair of the committee, which took things to another level. *God at work in stretching!*

During the business parts of the Assembly, the chair of Reference & Counsel had to read each resolution prior to discussion and voting. There were seven resolutions to be presented – so up and down I went. Some passed easily without much ado, but others took more time, people had

opinions they wanted to share, there was disagreement, there was tension, and dare I say, even conflict ... and our voting members decided (ha-ha!) I was the one responsible for causing the trouble! Hey ... all I did was read them ... don't blame me! God at work in teasing and business!

This year I celebrate 15 years of ordination. I was so excited to be able to receive my certificate ... signed by the Presiding Bishop of the ELCA, the ELCA Secretary, and our Bishop! It's hard to believe it will be 15 years in November! But, getting the document framed and displayed in my office will have to wait ... until the document gets reprinted with the correct date of my ordination (oops!) God at work in patience!

The Assembly offered many opportunities for learning, from the displays in the gathering space highlighting various ministries of the synod and churchwide to the workshops on Saturday afternoon. There was something for everyone and knowledge to be gained ... from care of creation to prayer practices, youth specific engagement to welcoming all, chaplains' roles to leaving a legacy, Holy Land insight to initiating befriending ministry ... *God at work in learning and teaching!*

And, then there was worship! Opening worship Friday night, prayer and song before each session, and a Synod-wide worship at Riverside Park. The youth voting members were communion servers (Graham even served the Bishop), the band was from Westby, and talented pastors in between. *God at work in the singing and in the message!*

We were truly "Rooted in God's love" as we gathered as a synod... and so are you ...take time to find it, take time to experience it, take time to share it ...

Synod Assembly Reflections



Our Savior's sent five voting members, along with Pastor Jean, to this year's LaCrosse Area Synod Assembly. Here is what they had to say about their experience.

Carla Burkhardt

Thank you for allowing me to be a voting delegate to the 2024 LaCrosse Synod Assembly June 7-9. The event began Friday evening with a short business meeting followed by worship. Saturday was largely business (budget and voting on "resolutions") but also included break-out workshops and presentations/recognitions. Sunday was of course the church service held at Riverside Park. Here are a few things that stuck out for me:

- 1. Those who gathered were approximately 30% clergy and 70% lay delegates. They watched the percentages carefully as it is required to have at least 60% lay delegates when votes are cast. I recognized a number of the other delegates. It was nice to have an increased emphasis on youth and we were happy to have Graham as part of our delegation.
- 2. I attended 2 workshops; one was about the process of adopting policy statements (informative, but not riveting...) and the other, led by former campus pastor Ben Morris, was an extensive history review of Jordan and Israel. I would have liked to hear more from him!

3. The music was my favorite part! A praise band from Westby led most of the music, but our Bishop is extremely talented! I did not know until Sunday that he had majored in music for his undergraduate degree. I also enjoyed being part of the choir that worked up a song for the Sunday service.

I hope that others are interested in attending this gathering in years to come in order to meet clergy and delegates from the region as well as gain a broader understanding of the ELCA mission.

Jaime Fortier

I really enjoyed Synod Assembly as it gave me an opportunity to connect with other Lutherans in our area. I enjoyed listening to the Bishop share his message and the music is always my favorite. One of my favorite parts was Sunday morning at Riverside Park: as we were enjoying the music I turned around and saw so many smiling faces, some familiar and some new, all there to worship!

Graham Sjoquist

One thing I liked about the assembly was that I got to see a couple people from Sugar Creek I haven't seen for a while. Another thing I liked about the assembly is that we got to pick workshops we wanted to learn a little bit more about. I picked the one about Israel and Gaza because I didn't really know much about it but now I do after going to the workshop. One thing that surprised me is how approachable the bishop is. I had a great opportunity to eat lunch with the bishop and had great conversations. One thing I learned is that some people don't agree with others and you have to be patient with them to come to an agreement. The biggest thing I took away from this great experience was how can we include all ages from young to old in our synod.

Melissa Haldeman

Synod Assembly was graciously hosted by First Lutheran Church in Onalaska. Once again, as it is every year, the gathering was filled with worship and song. As a music lover and singer, I appreciated that songs and singing accompanied our breaks between business. It was also nice to connect with new people



and reconnect with people that I haven't seen in years.

As delegates we had an opportunity to attend two workshops. I chose *Listening to the Creative God of Love* presented by Sister Julia Walsh and *Contested Land* presented by Pastor Benjamin Morris. I enjoyed learning from both presenters.

Pastor Ben's talk focused on the history of the people who have occupied the Holy Land from ancient times to today. He gave historical information on the conflicts through the ages and how modern history continues to shape the present-day conflict in the region.

Sister Julia is a Franciscan Sister of Perpetual Adoration, author, and the host of her own podcast called *Messy Jesus*. Sister Julia is full of youthful energy and creativity. She is nothing like the middle to senior citizen aged Nuns that I had as college instructors at Viterbo during the 1980's. Her workshop focused on thinking outside the box, exploring creative ways to practice contemplative prayer. She discussed, then let us explore different types of contemplative prayer during several 5-minute sessions of silence. Some examples of Contemplative prayer are Mantras, Centering prayers, Divine Readings, Labyrinths, and Eucharistic Adoration. With each type of prayer, you take time to center your breath, embrace compassion, offer intercession, then enter receptive silence.

She offered us the ability to use artistic expressions like drawing and collages, writing and reading, plus a wooden labyrinth. My favorite was using the labyrinth. I placed my index finger at the start, closed my eyes, and moved my finger through the winding path. Several times the labyrinth's path sharply changed directions, leading me to an unexpected direction that made me feel like I was heading away from the center, not towards it. I quickly realized that our lives are much like the labyrinth. How many times have we thought we knew where our life was heading, and that we had ultimate control of it. Then suddenly, our path changes into uncharted territory, seemingly in the opposite direction of where we assumed we needed to go. But like my experience with the labyrinth, if we stop trying to be in control, relax, and put our trust in God, he will lead us back to him, the center of the labyrinth.

I also went to Pastor Ben's session but I think Melissa has covered that fairly well. I went to [the environment discussion] session to hear what the environmental people had to say about how we should be going Green. Half of what they said I believe is generally true with regards to eliminating waste such as using less electricity, avoid throwing out food by consuming your leftovers, eat more vegetables and less meat, turn the thermostat up or down depending on the season when you are gone for more than a couple days, consider installing a heat pump when replacing your heating and air conditioning system, planting trees, and rethinking transportation – basically common sense things.

Editor's note – Jeff also expressed some concerns about the role of government in environmental work, and the sharing of land acknowledgements. A reminder that we continue to dialogue in love and care about issues over which we do not all agree. Thank you, Jeff, for sharing that reminder!




Building Projects Update

Ceiling Tile Replacement Project



We are going to say **goodbye** to the worn and damaged ceiling tiles in the **Gathering Area!** The pictures say it all.

Our Property Committee has approved the purchase of 19 cases of Astro ceiling tiles with an expected arrival date in 3-4 weeks. We will have a ceiling tile replacement "party" Thursday, August 8 and Friday, August 9 from 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM

and we need your help! Note: We *may* need to have a few volunteers work Saturday morning if the project extends beyond Friday. A **sign-up sheet** has been placed in the **Gathering Area**.

Please consider helping if you have at least a <u>half-day</u> to dedicate to this important project. We will make it a rewarding day for all.

- We need eight workers per day plus a couple of energetic youth to help remove tiles to the dumpster.
- A team leader will be available to facilitate the project.
- Snacks and lunch will be provided each day for workers.
- We will have scaffolding to assist in the installation process.
- We need one volunteer to help provide a full-sided trailer (or arrange a dumpster) so that we can remove the old tiles and haul them away.
